

New member Nancy Swain was not present.

If These Walls Could Talk -- Fun Facts from Our Clubhouse History: Member Kim Gould read an excerpt researched by Member Susan Pappas entitled "Our Beginning." When the club began in the 1920s, women had gained the right to vote, were able to wear shorter skirts, gas was 14 cents a gallon, movie tickets were 15 cents, and the average house cost \$2,938. The club met on the second and fourth Wednesdays of the month and dues were 25 cents annually. Thirteen women met to organize a ladies' club and a committee was soon formed to approach Mr. Forkner for property on which to build a clubhouse.

**President's Report:** President Desiree Ward thanked all the members including the executive board, board of directors, Trash to Treasure committee, Maker's Market committee, and the Handbook committee who worked over the summer. Desiree also said it was very rewarding to watch the nursing students receive the Club's scholarship awards.

September 10, 2025 General Meeting Minutes, continued

**Call to Order:** The meeting was called to order by President Desiree Ward at 12:30 p.m.

**Minutes:** Recording Secretary Charlotte Zylka Singer reported that the minutes from the May 14, 2025 General Luncheon Meeting had been published in the June 2025 Fig Leaf and needed approval. There were no additions or corrections. A motion was made by Member Suzy Wren to approve the minutes as published which was seconded by Member Diane Hill. The motion was voted on, and the minutes were approved.

**Treasurer's Report**: Treasurer Susan Simpson reported that the Club's B of A checking account, as of August 24, 2025, had a balance of \$21,196.93 and the investment accounts had a balance of \$149,696.63 for a total of \$170,893.56. Income for July 1, 2025 to August 24, 2025 was \$4,140 and expenses were \$17,570.72 for a net negative of \$13,430.72. Income has come in from the Handbook advertisements and Maker's Market with reports from those committees later in this meeting.

**Corresponding Secretary**: Corresponding Secretary Tamara Hargrave told those in attendance that the Club had received seven donations and two thank you notes from the State Center Community College and the Heart of the Horse Therapy Ranch.

Board of Trustee's Report: President Desiree Ward gave a brief report to the membership about the action the executive board took over the summer. First, there will be an additional \$10 fee for using a credit card to pay annual dues. This is because FGWC is charged a percentage when a credit card is processed. Second, FGWC will be hosting the September 25, 2025 San Joaquin Valley District meeting at the clubhouse. Third, the executive board agreed that the contractors who provided free and discounted materials and services on the clubhouse kitchen remodel would have their business cards published in the club's Handbook. Fourth, the executive board, since the project was running under budget, agreed with the Preservation and Planning committee's request to also paint the main room during the remodeling process. Fifth, it was decided to suspend clubhouse rentals indefinitely. The board will consider requests to use the clubhouse for memorial services. Desiree announced that there is an opening for a member to volunteer to be the clubhouse rental coordinator. Desiree also told the membership that should a member need a ride to club meetings and events, members who volunteered to be drivers are listed on page 58 of the Handbook.

### STANDING COMMITTEES

Amenities: Co-Chair Kim Garcia said that the committee supports the membership by sending birthday cards and get well cards and making telephone calls. The committee also arranges meal trains. Kim urged members to contact her or Co-Chair Karen Tozlian if a member is ill or needs support.

**Memorial Building Fund**: Chair Kim Gould reported that as of September 9, 2025 fifteen donations in the sum of \$1,400 had been received in memory of Member Mary Vaughan and that thank you notes have been written to the donors. Kim further reported that as of June 30, 2025 Treasurer Susan Simpson had deposited \$300 in the Memorial Building Fund for the six members who passed away this year. Kim added that any other activity in the Memorial Building Fund will be addressed by the treasurer and six name plates were placed in the Book of Remembrance.

**Preservation and Planning**: Chair Martha Stewart informed those present that the kitchen remodeling project was finished early and came in \$2,500 under budget. Martha thanked Member Joyce Gaskins who acted as designer and project manager and Treasurer Susan Simpson. Cash on hand and \$8,800 (which was 15% of last year's profits and would have been deposited in the Building Maintenance Fund) was used to fund the project. Marsha announced that she will be making a donation to the Memorial Building Fund on behalf of the Preservation and Planning committee in Joyce's name.

### WAYS AND MEANS

**Maker's Market Craft Faire**: Chair Nancee Smith announced that the event is sold out with 44 vendors and five are on the waiting list. There will be honey, jelly, art, jewelry, crafts, crochet, and two food trucks. The free event will be on Saturday, October 11, 2025, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Handbook: President Desiree Ward reported for Chair Lillian Weiland saying that handbooks are available for pick up. Should you pick up another member's copy, you must sign out that you picked up the book. Desiree said that if any change or update is needed to be made to the digital version of the handbook, please email Members Suzanne Crosina-Sahm and Lillian Weiland. There is a flyer available today with contact information for the two new members who weren't included in the printed handbook. Desiree thanked Handbook Chair Lillian Weiland and Chair Pam Vogel and her proof reading committee for their hard work. Desiree also thanked Member Karen Tozlian for delivering copies of the handbook to homebound members. Desiree also reported that handbook advertisement sales made a profit of \$1,003.93.

**Trash to Treasur**e: Co-Chair Ellen Vietti announced that there will be rummage drop-off days on September 19th and October 3rd from 9 to 11 a.m. Ellen reminded the membership that gently used and clean items are being sought and there is a two hour minimum work requirement. Sign up sheets are being circulated. Donations should be boxed and labelled. There is also a sign up sheet for those wishing to help provide lunches. The event's pre-party will be held on Wednesday, October 29, 2025 from 5 to 7 p.m.

### SPECIAL COMMITTEES

**Federation Luncheon**: CFWC San Joaquin Valley District Representative Karen Tozlian informed those present that the 2025-2026 meetings will be held in different clubhouses. On Thursday, September 25, 2025, FGWC will host the first meeting. FGWC will provide the morning coffee and treats and a catered lunch. Members are welcome to attend, and the cost is \$35. Registration forms are available in the Fig Leaf. Contact Karen to help with the event, organize the microphones, and put together a \$50 gift basket.

**Get Acquainted Coffee**: Co-Chair Diane Hill announced that the next coffee will be on Tuesday, October 14, 2025, from 10 a.m. to Noon, at the home of Member Teresa Kirkorian.

Community Impact Committee: Member Karen Tozlian reported for Chair Libby Borchardt that the Federation's National Day of Service is Saturday, September 27. FGWC plans on assisting "Breaking the

Fifteen volunteers are needed to help with set up, manning the booths and cash registers, and tear down. Shifts will be from 6 to 9 a.m., 9 a.m to Noon, and Noon to 2 p.m. A sign up sheet is being circulated.

**Lion's Club Glasses**: Chair Tamara Hargrave said that prescription and reader glasses and hearing aids are needed to be sent to countries without good health care. Tamara will be putting a collection box in the clubhouse for donations. Please do not include glass cases.

### **Federation Report**

Karen Tozlian, District Representative



The San Joaquin Valley District (SJVD) met on Thursday, September 25, 7 p.m. President Desiree Ward and Sandra Knudsen joined me in the Zoom call. The Zoom meeting was held in the evening in hopes of reaching more SJVD members; however, 23 logged in.

President Deborah Gregory welcomed California Federation of Women's Club (CFWC) Officers:

Jill Dresher, Director of Finance, and Cindy Sanders, Membership, CFWC Administrative chairmen,

District past presidents, current District officers, and District committee chairs. Following a brief

welcome, Deborah expressed her concern over the size of our district, making it difficult for members to

attend district-level meetings and their ability to incur the cost of travel. She asked the state

representatives to take her concerns to the appropriate state level officers for consideration.

First Vice President Angie Nelson announced that several SJVD clubs received commendations for their report writing at the state convention held in Santa Clara in May.

Membership Cathie Petithomme reported a total of 575 members in SJVD.

Treasurer Cheryl Woody presented a proposed 2025-26 budget which set off a lengthy discussion regarding the reimbursement for two members who attended the Western States Regional Convention. The members were under the impression some expenses would be covered; however, the line item was not included in the present budget. A motion was made to approve the expenditure and add it to the current budget. Jill Dresher, CFWC Director of Finance, cautioned the board not to make this a practice. It's an unusual issue that should not occur again.

Auditor Kathy Ramos informed members that the audit report for 2024-25 was approved. Parliamentarian Sally Montgomery stated the bylaws continue to be revised and will be presented at the November 6 District meeting.

Club presidents shared individual club activities. President Desiree Ward spoke about: International Day of Service with Breaking the Chains (victims of human trafficking), Maker's Market with 45 vendors, Get Acquainted Coffee, Trash to Treasure, new member Harvest Party, and a shopping trip to Santana Row and Valley Fair Mall by bus.

The next meeting will be November 6, 2025, Coalinga Woman's Club and we adjourned at 8:53 pm.



- 4. Drag the app to the home screen page, lifting your finger to place the app


